BC Trail Fund Proposal - Executive Summary

Issue

British Columbia's 44,000 km of sanctioned recreational trails, 83% of which lie outside our provincial parks, need a dedicated trail fund to support their annual maintenance needs and limit liability exposure to the Province. Most trails are in a moderate to an advanced state of degradation due to the lack of stable funding for trail maintenance and ever-growing usage.

Trails across the province rely on over 200 community-based nonprofit organizations that provide essential construction and routine maintenance. They contribute an estimated minimum of 62,000 volunteer hours annually. These same groups report concern over trail deterioration due to the lack of necessary financial support to fund their upkeep. Given more funding, they report an extremely high likelihood of taking on further trail projects.

Well-managed trails and healthy outdoor spaces are integral to BC's outdoor recreation economy and our reputation as a world-class destination. They facilitate rural economic development, achieve community health benefits, foster reconciliation through increased Indigenous representation in recreation, and reduce impacts on the environment, species at risk and archaeological values.

Supporting the ongoing work of community-based recreation groups is the most cost-effective way for the Province to manage trails and other recreational infrastructure. With easier access to dedicated funding for trail maintenance and enhancement, trail stewards can spend less time fundraising and more time improving BC's trails and developing these valuable community assets.

Solution

The Outdoor Recreation Council of BC invites the Province of British Columbia to make a \$10 million seed contribution to help launch the BC Trail Fund. The vision of the new fund is to establish a vehicle for engaging the broader community to partner with BC's trail stewardship groups to pursue a world-renowned, sustainable provincial trail network.

The key objectives of the grant program are to:

- Maintain and enhance the existing recreational trail network.
- Improve the quality of the existing recreational trail network and user experience through improvements to safety, signage and access.
- As funding permits, develop new trail and recreation infrastructure projects.

The fund will prioritize considerations that advance the goals of the Province and specifically those of the Trails Strategy for British Columbia. Priorities include:

- Supporting Indigenous Peoples through involvement and cultural respect.
- Promoting collaboration in trail planning, development and maintenance.
- Fostering diverse and inclusive participation in trail-based recreation.
- Increasing opportunities for physical activities for all ability levels.
- Supporting sustainability and environmental stewardship.
- Contributing to rural development and community-based tourism opportunities.

Many sectors are interested in seeing BC's trail system restored and improved. To date, ORCBC has received 45 letters from communities, Indigenous and local governments, recreational groups, gear manufacturers and tourism showing their support for the fund.

The BC Trail Fund, when established, will offer reliable and consistent access to grants for eligible nonprofit organizations, First Nations and local governments that manage and maintain BC's trails. It will be jointly managed by the ORCBC and the Vancouver Foundation, with oversight by an advisory committee. ORCBC will solicit additional contributions from other levels of government, corporations, foundations and individuals to create a significant endowment that will provide continuing benefits for BC communities and their visitors.

Supporting Trail Stewards & Fostering Thriving Communities

This proposal invites the Province of British Columbia to make a \$10 million contribution as part of a new fund that will provide financial support to community-based recreation organizations, Indigenous Nations and local governments that deliver ongoing stewardship of the province's network of recreational trails and facilities.

The BC Trail Fund is created in response to a longstanding need for a reliable and diverse funding model to support BC's trail system. It will be managed by the Outdoor Recreation Council of British Columbia and the Vancouver Foundation, with oversight by an advisory committee.

Contributions will be solicited from government, corporations, foundations and individuals as part of an ongoing fund development program.

Introduction

Trails and recreation areas in BC have seen unprecedented usage levels during the pandemic as British Columbians have looked for ways to stay active, improve their overall well-being, connect socially with friends and explore the province. There are no signs to suggest that the current interest levels will wane in the future. The booming interest has put extraordinary pressure on the outdoors, and consequently, BC's recreation infrastructure, the natural environment and cultural values are showing significant damage and degradation due to insufficient routine maintenance and overuse.

British Columbia (BC) has more than 44,000 kilometres of officially recognized trails that receive visits from millions of locals and visitors each year. The provincial trail network facilitates many different outdoor activities and supports healthy active lifestyles, tourism, rural economic development, environmental awareness, accessibility and inclusion, and reconciliation through increased Indigenous representation in recreation planning, development and management¹.

The development and maintenance of BC trails and recreation infrastructure rely heavily on grassroots support from over two hundred community-based recreation groups who report increasing burnout and face limited access to funding to support their work, especially for trail improvements. As a result, British Columbians experience closed trails,

deteriorating trail conditions, and overcrowding, and the Province misses out on many health, social and economic benefits.

These issues will continue to worsen especially with the growth in trail-based recreation and without improved access to dedicated financial resources that can address the current backlog of deferred maintenance and ongoing routine upkeep².

In its report on the 2022 budget consultation³, the Select Standing Committee on Finance and Government Services acknowledged the significant surge in park and trail usage during the pandemic and how the increased use has resulted in under-maintained trails being further eroded due to financial shortages and an operational reliance on volunteers. Among its recommendations, the committee recommended: "provide increased funding for parks, recreation and trails to address gaps in maintenance and staff, including dedicated funding to community-based organizations for trail maintenance and development." The proposed trail fund addresses the committee's recommendations.

Proposal

The Trails Strategy for British Columbia⁴ and recent user surveys identify inconsistent and insufficient funding for the upkeep of BC's recreation infrastructure as a barrier to the sustainable development and maintenance of trails in BC and to achieving the vision of a world-class trail system.

Supporting the existing work of community-based trail steward groups, local governments and First Nations is a very cost-effective way for the Province to manage sites and trails on Crown lands. These groups often leverage volunteer hours, in-kind resources, and expertise that reduce the cost of trail work. Providing the groups with funding allows the Province to continuously benefit from resources that only these groups can access.

The Province of BC is currently missing an opportunity to further derive value from community-based trail steward groups. A survey of BC's trail organizations⁵ showed that the responding organizations working on trails contribute over 62,900 volunteer hours per year, valued at around \$1.6 million. They maintain over 8,500 kilometres of trails per year. This is the equivalent of 20% of all the Province's officially recognized trails. However, these volunteers are burning out due to the difficulties in accessing resources to support their work. The responding organizations perceive accessing funds to be very difficult. Furthermore, about 50% of them cannot undertake trail projects because of a lack of

funding, and 90% of organizations surveyed would be highly likely to apply for trail funding if available. The groups' interest in furthering their capacity to care for trail infrastructure represents an incredible opportunity for the Province.

The need for trail funding across the province is varied and diverse. The fund can be designed to meet different needs and evolve over time. To illustrate, existing funds that support trail projects have funded projects that cost between \$900 to \$980,000, with most project costs landing between \$15,000 to \$20,000. An analysis of the trail survey data showed the likelihood of trail organizations needing between \$993,750.00 and \$1,987,500 (based on the needs of 50 and 100 organizations respectively)⁶ each year.

This first-of-its-kind fund in BC will offer grants to eligible organizations to undertake trail and recreation facility enhancement and maintenance across BC, serving all types of trail users and communities.

The Outdoor Recreation Council of British Columbia (ORCBC) will administer the fund in partnership with the Vancouver Foundation as the fund manager, and an advisory committee will make funding recommendations that will be submitted to the ORCBC board of directors for final approval.

As an initial investment, we request a meaningful contribution from the Province of BC to create a fund that provides a perpetual funding source. Additional funding will be sought from other levels of government, corporations, foundations and individuals, as part of an ongoing fund development program.

Vision and Goals

The BC Trail Fund's vision is to establish a vehicle for engaging the broader community to partner with BC's trail stewardship groups to pursue a world-renowned, sustainable provincial trail network.

The fund will provide reliable and consistent access to grants for eligible non-profit organizations, First Nations and local governments that are involved in delivering continued stewardship and maintenance of trails; it leverages funds from different sources and provides an efficient and effective way for corporations, organizations and individuals to support outdoor recreation in BC financially.

The overarching objectives for the grant program include to:

- Maintain and enhance the existing recreational trail network.
- Improve the quality of the existing recreational trail network or user experience, including safety improvements, signage, wayfinding, and barriers to access.

• As funding permits, new trail and recreation infrastructure projects.

While the priority is to support trail maintenance and enhancements, it is possible for this fund also to support new trail and infrastructure developments, along with trail programs that promote safety; diversity, inclusion, accessibility and equity; Indigenous stewardship; and other types of applicants who require help in accessing funds for trail and recreation projects.

When established, this fund could be the first funding stream in a larger and broader BC Outdoor Fund that focuses on enhancing infrastructure through the BC Trail Fund, inspiring British Columbians about the outdoors through education, outreach and programs, while protecting habitats and cultural values through monitoring, evaluation and research.

Linkages to the BC Trail Strategy

The BC Trail Fund supports the vision of the Trails Strategy of British Columbia: "A world-renowned, sustainable network of trails, with opportunities for all, which provides benefits for trails users, communities and the Province."

The guidelines of the provincial trails strategy are:

- Respect, recognition and engagement with First Nations' governments.
- Sound environmental stewardship and management.
- Mutual respect between trail interests and other resource users.
- Respect and understanding among diverse trail interests.
- Partnerships and collaboration.
- Secure recreation opportunities for all trail users.
- Benefits for individuals, communities, tourism and the Province.

The evaluation criteria of the fund will intentionally direct applicants to prioritize several considerations in their application that advance the goals of the trails strategy:

- Indigenous support, involvement and respect for Indigenous values.
- Collaboration in trail planning, development and maintenance.
- Fostering diverse and inclusive participation in trail-based recreation.
- Increasing opportunities for physical activities for all ability levels.
- Sustainability and environmental stewardship.
- Contribution to rural development and community-based tourism opportunities.

Benefits of the BC Trail Fund

Some of the benefits of the fund include:

- Support the Province of BC's ongoing efforts to create true and lasting reconciliation with Indigenous peoples in BC by fostering opportunities at the local level for inter-community relationship building, cultural heritage protection and celebration.
- Facilitate activities that are important to British Columbians and our visitors, including repairing damaged trails, increasing accessibility for various users, addressing environmental issues, incorporating Indigenous culture and heritage values, and improving or adding trail infrastructure and amenities.
- Establish an ongoing vehicle for engaging the broader community to partner with BC's trail stewardship groups to pursue a world-renowned, sustainable provincial trail network. When established, considerations may be given to upscaling and creating a larger and broader BC Outdoor Fund with additional funding streams for programs and initiatives that foster diverse and inclusive participation in outdoor recreation and protects habitats and cultural values.
- It is due mainly to the hard work of thousands of volunteers that trails and recreation facilities continue to exist. Supporting the existing work of community-based trail steward groups is a very cost-effective way for the Province to manage trails and other recreational infrastructure. By providing easier access to dedicated funds for trail maintenance and enhancement, trail stewards can spend less time fundraising and more time improving trails and developing valuable community assets.

Fund Management

The fund is set up as a partnership between the Vancouver Foundation as the fund manager and the Outdoor Recreation Council of BC is responsible for administering the grant program, dispersing funds, soliciting additional funding and promoting the fund.

A dedicated BC Trail Fund Advisory Committee provides oversight and will review and recommend successful funding proposals to the ORCBC board of directors for final approval. Grant intakes will initially take place once a year. Membership will include representatives from ORCBC, provincial and local governments, Indigenous organizations or governments, trail groups, tourism organizations and the outdoor sector at large. Committee members will get appointed by the Provincial Trails Advisory Body for a two-year term.

The annual fund management costs, based on a \$10 endowment million fund, are \$230,000⁷ and approximately \$350,000⁸ will be made in annual distributions to successful applicants if the entire investment is put into an endowment. If a portion of

the investment is entered into a transferrable fund, additional annual funds can be released as grants. With added contributions from other funding sources, the annual disbursements will increase.

Eligibility and Matching Requirements

This fund is intended for non-profit organizations, local governments and First Nations based in BC. Projects must be "publicly accessible," meaning a trail on public land or accessible to the public under reasonable conditions, and must be operated on a non-commercial basis. The proposed work must be authorized by the landowner or land manager.

Eligible projects include:

- Maintenance and enhancements of the existing recreational trail network, including bridge and water crossing construction, upgrades and rehabilitation.
- Improvements of the quality of the current recreational trail network or the users' experience, including safety improvements, signage, wayfinding, horse corrals and barriers to access.
- As funding permits, new trail and recreation infrastructure projects.

Funding requests are needs-based, and there is no set minimum or maximum amount for which applicants can apply. Based on discussions with the Provincial Trails Advisory Body, survey data, and data from existing funds, we expect most grants will be between \$2,000 to \$10,000.

The funding will be provided as matching grants to eligible recipients for eligible projects. Projects must include matching contributions from other sources, which can be a combination of monetary and in-kind gifts such as volunteer time, donated labour, equipment, services, and materials from other sources. The overall objective for the grant is a match ratio of 1:1. The monetary contribution must be a minimum of 50% of the matching contributions.

About Us

The Outdoor Recreation Council of BC has prepared this proposal with significant support from the Provincial Trails Advisory Body. It is the result of a project which was initiated in 2020 to investigate, propose and set up a new dedicated and sustainable funding mechanism for trail maintenance in BC.

The Outdoor Recreation Council of BC is an umbrella organization composed of more than 60 organizational members that represent the broad and diverse spectrum of outdoor recreation user groups in BC, including paddlers, hikers, mountain bikers, and off-road motorcyclists, equestrians, snowmobilers, quad riders, anglers and nature interests. We work to promote and advocate for access to and responsible use of BC's outdoors for public recreation, build bridges between outdoor recreation groups and represent the broad interests of the public outdoor recreation community to government.

Launched by the Province in 2015, the Provincial Trails Advisory Body (PTAB) is a working group made up of 15 members, including two co-chairs, eight individuals representing public outdoor recreation, four provincial government agencies and a regional government representative. The PTAB's primary role is to provide advice to the government on implementation strategies consistent with the intent of the trails strategy; to lead a periodic, formal review of the Trails Strategy; and provide a collaborative forum for the many trail organizations and interests to ensure that the Trails Strategy continues to meet the needs of all trail users.

I am writing to support the Outdoor Recreation Council of BC's proposal for a \$10 million endowment for the BC Trail Fund.

The BC Marine Trails (BCMT) was formed in 2009 to establish marine routes along the coastline. Its charitable purposes are to identify, map and preserve a network of marine access points and public recreational sites along the British Columbia coastline for use by the general public and to protect the environment for the benefit of the public by conducting environmental stewardship projects designed to preserve and protect flora and fauna. The BCMT follows a three-pillar approach in our operations: respectful First Nations engagement, development of safe marine trails (i.e. safe distances between sites) and protecting the environment through our Marine Trail Code of Conduct and stewardship projects.

The BC Marine Trails manages or co-manages 17 sites including recreational sites and building a site on a park. There has only been limited funding to support maintenance and virtually no funding to support infrastructure. We also need to work closely and respectfully with First Nations as part of reconciliation efforts when building trails. There are no funds. In the past two years, the BCMT has seen a dramatic increase in local site usage and more people using our trails and resources. Proper funding by the province is needed for upkeep, stewardship, citizen-based reconciliation, infrastructure, and other endeavours. Clearly, smaller communities benefit from the work of non-profits. The BC Trail Fund will help ensure that there's a long-term plan for caring for these valuable assets.

The BCMT looks forward to the formation of the BC Trail Fund and the value that this new funding mechanism will bring to the outdoor recreation community, tourism interests and the province as a whole.

At its regular meeting last night, the Board of the Meadowbrook Community Association (MCA) instructed me to submit this letter of support for the Outdoor Recreation Council of BC's proposal for a \$10 million endowment for the BC Trail Fund.

The MCA is an incorporated society of 100+ members whose Constitutional Purpose is "To preserve and enhance the Meadowbrook and Woods Corner areas for residents and other recreational users". The two areas mentioned are rural areas directly east of the City of Kimberley.

In its 10-year history, the MCA has raised sufficient funds to purchase a 420+ acre mining claim, to have the claim removed permanently from the mineral tenure system of BC, and to have it replaced by a 40-acre regional park that includes Cherry Creek Falls, and a 380+ acre recreation reserve. The area is now an attraction for residents and visitors.

The MCA's efforts have also resulted in the area surrounding McGinty Lake being designated as an Interpretive Forest, the entire area being refenced, and a picnic area being developed with a washroom, tables, benches and a fire pit. The MCA maintains trails in that area under a Recreation Sites and Trail Agreement with the Province. We are currently identifying trails in the aforementioned 380+ acres that we wish to incorporate into that agreement.








Figure 1 – Coastal Connector Trail Vision and Route Options

The Squamish Off-Road Cycling Association (SORCA) was established in 1992. We are a volunteer driven trail advocacy group with more than 2600 members who voluntarily sign up every year in support of our trails. Annually SORCA enlists more than 100 businesses to contribute to the well being of the Squamish's trails, both through weekly events that drive our membership, and through financial partnerships and donations.

Trail counters in the Sea-to-Sky area measured a staggering 150 percent increase in traffic between 2019 and 2020. Trail use in Squamish continues to grow exponentially, with 2021 trail counts measuring over 50,000 uses for some trails over just an 8 month period. In addition to increased visitation, Squamish is experiencing an influx of new residents attracted to the natural beauty, unique lifestyle, and opportunities for outdoor recreation. Despite this, there remains a glaring lack of basic facilities and support for outdoor recreation in many places. This fund is needed by everyone who looks after trails and recreation assets in BC. The upkeep and stewardship of our existing trails, facilities and outdoor spaces are fundamental to rural economies like ours. I am writing to support the Outdoor Recreation Council of BC's proposal for a \$10 million endowment for the BC Trail Fund.

The Tri-Cities Off Road Cycling Association (TORCA) has been a volunteer-run, non-profit society since November 2013 and as of April 2016, a Canadian registered charity. TORCA's mission is to provide public recreational amenities by planning, designing, constructing and maintaining trails in the tri-cities of Coquitlam, Port Coquitlam, Port Moody & villages of Belcarra & Anmore. TORCA advocates for all trail users, including mountain bikers, trail runners, hikers, and dog walkers. The 2021 membership reached a record 674, and is already at over 390 in 2022. Beyond the membership, the creation of safe trails opens outdoor spaces to the ~234,300 tri-cities residents, plus the many visitors to the region.

We support ORCBC's proposal, because the fund is needed by the numerous non-profit, largely volunteer-run, associations in BC who do tremendous work to care for the trails and the users. The pandemic has brought a surge in trail users that is here to stay. Our data shows that on popular routes in the Tri-Cities, trail usage has increased by up to 600%. To maintain the trails in a safe condition for the users, in a sustainable condition for the environment, and to provide adequate recreational opportunities for different skill levels, we have had to rely more on paid trail builders and purchase more tools and signage. At the same time, COVID recovery grants are disappearing, which makes it harder to find funding to maintain the same level of work on the trails. We also appreciate the effort ORCBC puts into involving Indigenous communities and fostering diverse and inclusive participation. The BC Trail Fund will help ensure that there's a long-term plan for caring for these valuable assets.



The Vancouver Island Trail Association (VITA) is a volunteer, not-for-profit organization building a non-motorized hiking trail from Victoria to Cape Scott. Once complete the trail has world class potential and will be approximately 800 km long.

The VITA supports the Outdoor Recreation Council of BC's (ORCBC) proposal for a \$10 million endowment for the establishment of the BC Trail Fund. The VITA has been dedicated to trail building and maintenance projects on Vancouver Island as our main objective since our formation in 2011. Since then, VITA has cleared over 175 km of trails, maintains about 75 km of trail annually and has installed 3-4,000 trail markers. To accomplish this work, VITA volunteers have provided more than 4,000 hours annually on the Vancouver Island Trail over the last 5 years.

Funding for trail projects has always been an issue and with increasing number of people engaging in outdoor activities, volunteers can no longer handle the upkeep on all the trails without support. We need a dedicated funding source as proposed by ORCBC. A dedicated BC Trail Fund is needed to support development and maintenance of trails, access to trails and outdoor recreation infrastructure in BC. It is needed by volunteers, communities and organizations, which are seeking to grow BC's outdoor recreation opportunities and amenities. The upkeep and stewardship of our existing trails, facilities and outdoor spaces are fundamental to thriving communities and regional economies. Without long-term and dedicated funding, loss of access to trailheads, deterioration of trails, overcrowding and associated environmental damage will continue to occur. I am writing to support the Outdoor Recreation Council of BC's proposal for a \$10 million endowment for the BC Trail Fund. On Monday April 11, 2022 Council unanimously supported this resolution:

THAT Council support the submission of a Letter of Support to the province for the Outdoor Recreation Council of BC's proposal for a \$10 million endowment for the BC Trail Fund.

Inconsistent and insufficient funding has been identified as a key barrier in the province's <u>Trails Strategy for BC</u> goal of sustainable trail development and maintenance. In response, ORC – whom the Village holds membership with as a local government and whom co-chair the <u>Provincial Trails Advisory Body</u> – have proposed the creation of a BC Trail Fund.

In regards to the local context, the Village of Cumberland is directly involved in the funding of the management and maintenance of the internationally renown Cumberland Trail Network. This includes direct responsibility for managing and maintaining over 25 kilometers of recreational trails in both the Cumberland Community Forest Park and the Village-owned Watershed Lands. Most of these trails are maintained as part of a service contract with Village partner and non-profit society, the United Riders of Cumberland (UROC).

Additionally, the Village also provides funding to UROC in support of their trail management and maintenance responsibilities for the remaining approximately 200 kilometers of recreational trails on private forest lands that make up the Cumberland Trail Network.

While the Village, UROC and other partners and supporters of the trails have developed a robust trail management framework, much work still needs to be done. This work is wide ranging, but includes many objectives, including:

- Collaborative trail planning;
- Trail maintenance and development projects as guided by the <u>Cumberland</u> <u>Community Forest Park Interim Trail Management Plan</u> and <u>Forest Lands:</u> <u>Management Direction Statement;</u>
- Improve the quality of trail experiences, including safety improvements, signage, wayfinding, and other barriers to access;
- Trail head amenities;
- Sustainability and environmental stewardship, including watershed protection;
- Exploring opportunities for Indigenous support and involvement.

Access to funding from a BC Trail Fund would benefit the Village in achieving the above objectives, in addition to providing an additional funding resource for UROC to access.
